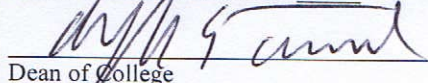

The readings will offer critiques of the ways in which gender and sexuality are constructed and policed, and provide a framework for deconstructing the binaries of hetero/homo and masculinity/femininity. Prerequisites: ENGL 111, WGSS 148, 220 or 233 or instructor's permission. Offered at least once a year.

WGSS 374, Queer Theories and Politics, surveys major readings and movements in the developing field of sexuality studies. "Queer," a term often associated with bigotry, is a term that has been reclaimed by scholars and activists since the late 1980s. "Queer," as a political and theoretical framework, offers an analysis to disrupt politics and identity categories in order to challenge ideas of social "normality" and power. Students will examine queer activism in relation to contemporary politics in order to build a sexuality studies lens. This course fills a writing flag, which will develop students' writing skills.

2. A statement of how this course will contribute to the departmental curriculum.

This course will develop our program's curriculum in the transition to Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies. WGSS 374, Queer Theories and Politics, will offer minors the opportunity to engage readings and research in the growing field of sexuality studies.

This course is added at the 300 level because it depends on prior course work and is an in-depth analysis of theory and politics. This course fills a writing flag.
