We will offer a new class, WGSS374, Queer Theories and Politics, as an option to the theory requirement for WAGS/WGSS minors. We have renumbered WAGS333 to WAGS233 align it with other general education classes as a 200-level course. WAGS/WGSS minors will be able to choose between WGSS220 or 233 to satisfy a minor requirement, so instead of 3 to 4 sections of WAGS220 offered each semester, we will split those offerings between 220 and 233.

Why Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies?

The minor in women's, gender, and sexuality studies brings three fields of inquiry into conversation in order to engage critical analyses ranging from the personal to the global at the intersections of sex, gender, sexuality, race, class, ethnicity, and ability.

- Women's Studies: foregrounds the lived experience and material conditions of women
- Gender Studies: highlights the social construction of masculinities and femininities
- Sexuality Studies: focuses on sexual behaviors, expressions, identities, and politics

It is integral to understand women's studies, gender studies, and sexuality studies as having distinct disciplinary histories **and** as overlapping and transformational when taught in relation to one another.

The curriculum intentionally draws from these three fields to approach problems of sex, gender, and sexuality from various critical angles.

In readings, writings, and discussions in the course, students will learn background information about LGBTQ people and issues and acquire the skills necessary to thoughtfully evaluate evidence, rhetoric, and argument in discussions of topics related to the LGBTO community; brief statement: this course is included in the minor requirements to give students the option to examine the cultural, legal, and political dimensions of LGBTO life in the U.S.
